c. (5 points) Find the derivative of $f(s) = \frac{1}{\sqrt{s+1}}$ using the definition of derivative.

- 3. g''(x) > 0 for 2 < x < 4.
- 4. g(4) = 2.
- 5. $\lim_{x \to 4} g(x) = 0.$
- 6. g is continuous at x = 5 but not differentiable at x = 5.
- 7. g'(0) = 0.
